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About W+AACC

The Williamstown + Atlanta Art Conservation Center (W+AACC) is a non-profit organization comprised of regional conservation centers in the Northeast and Southeast. It has a member consortium of over fifty organizations throughout the East Coast, many private clients, and is the largest regional conservation center in the country.

The conservators adhere to the Code of Ethics and Guidelines for Practice formulated by the American Institute for Conservation of Historic & Artistic Works (AIC), the national membership organization of conservation professionals.

Mission

W+AACC's mission is to protect, conserve and maintain heritage objects from all cultures; to provide examination, treatment, consultation, and related conservation services for member institutions and other non-profit organizations, corporations, and individuals; to conduct educational programs with respect to the care and conservation of works of art and objects of cultural interest; to participate in the training of conservators; to promote the importance of conservation and increase the awareness of the issues pertinent to collections care; and to conduct research and disseminate knowledge to advance the profession.

History

The organization was founded in 1977 on the campus of the Sterling and Francine Clark Art Institute in Williamstown, Massachusetts. Since 2008, the Williamstown labs have been located at The Clark's Lunder Center at Stone Hill, designed by Pritzker Prize-winning architect Tadao Ando. The Atlanta center was established in 2001 as a partnership with the Williamstown Art Conservation Center and the High Museum of Art in Atlanta, Georgia, recognizing that cultural institutions throughout the Southeast were in need of conservation services. The Atlanta labs occupy an ultramodern shared facility near The High.



Services

W+AACC partners with museums, libraries, educational institutions, historical societies, archives, corporations, independent art professionals, and private collectors on all aspects of collections care. The organization offers consultation and treatment for the preservation of a full range of artworks and artifacts, as well as scientific analysis of the highest quality for materials characterization and identification. The highly skilled team of conservators is expert in multiple disciplines: paintings, works on paper, photographs, sculpture, multimedia objects, textiles, furniture, frames, decorative arts, conservation science, and modern and contemporary art. W+AACC conservators have treated well-known works of art, including Jackson Pollock's *Number 2, 1949*, Thomas Hart Benton's *America Today* murals, Vincent van Gogh's *Irises*, and Picasso's *Le Tricorne*.

Outreach

Education and professional development are integral to the organization's mission. Staff at both facilities engage with the public through programming, education, and active community outreach. Staff engages with the field through training and mentoring graduate and pre-program conservation interns, publishing scholarly articles, and presenting new research at conferences and other specialized gatherings. In Williamstown specifically, the conservators teach a popular course at Williams College that introduces undergraduate and graduate students to the history, methods, and materials of the discipline of conservation.

Based in Williamstown, Massachusetts, and requiring frequent, regular travel, this salaried, full-time position is responsible for the vision, strategy, and financial health of the overall organization and the programming, operations, facilities, and staff at both the Williamstown and Atlanta locations. The position reports to the Board of Trustees. Salary is commensurate with experience and includes a competitive benefits package.

Core responsibilities and duties

Leadership

Serve as the face of the organization.

Activate and follow through with an overarching vision for the future.

Lead, manage, inspire, and motivate staff in both centers, including pre-program interns. Oversee and ensure a positive organizational culture.

Establish and maintain a connection to, and deeper interaction with, regional and national communities.

Embrace and promote the possibilities presented by technology.

Within the first year, and in collaboration with the Board of Trustees, develop a long-range strategy and tactical plan that ensures fiscal stability while allowing the organization to fulfill its core mission.



Core responsibilities and duties (con't)

Operations

Manage facilities, including collaborating with the Clark Art Institute and the High Museum of Art on mutually beneficial rental terms for the Williamstown and Atlanta lab spaces.

Oversee all Human Resources matters, including staff performance management and salaries. Within the first year, the Executive Director will need to consider the Director of Operations role, a position that will open due to an upcoming retirement.

Oversee and manage all budgets in partnership with the Board Finance Committee. Within the first year, the Executive Director will need to analyze and modify the current business model to balance the transactional with the inspirational.

Manage Board and staff relations.

Evaluate existing contracts, policies and procedures, and make modifications to improve operations, workflow and budget impact.



Core responsibilities and duties (con't)

Program and Engagement

Develop sustainable programs and initiatives that advance the educational mission to train, mentor, and inspire the next generation of conservators.

Develop opportunities and initiatives for member institutions and individuals that highlight conservation work.

Collaborate with curators, collectors, and educators on projects and initiatives that help advance the field of conservation.

Interact with the public, introducing them to the discipline and teaching them about the value of conserving and preserving objects of artistic, historical, and cultural significance.



Core responsibilities and duties (con't)

External Affairs

Establish and foster engagement with member institutions and private clients.

Build upon the ongoing relationships with the Clark Art Institute and Williams College Museum of Art in Williamstown, and the High Museum of Art in Atlanta.

Proactively travel to support relationships with existing partners and clients, and find and develop new partnerships, engagement, and fundraising opportunities.

Raise the overall visibility of the organization through marketing initiatives, programming, and professional and public outreach.

Establish a vital fundraising program to support the organization's work.

Keep abreast of new research and developments in conservation and preservation.

Work to develop the organization's reputation in local, national, and international arts communities.



Qualifications

Required

Proven leadership and management skills.

Vision and the ability to execute that vision sustainably. Creative and expansive thinking, unafraid of innovative ideas with the ability to nurture those ideas and bring them to fulfillment.

Ability to understand, create and manage budgets.

Proven fundraising experience, including the ability to raise funds creatively and obtain grants to support mission-focused work.

Advanced degree in art conservation, art history, or related field and at least seven years of experience in a museum or similar environment caring for collections of notable quality, or an equivalent combination of experience and education.

Demonstrated skills in, or proven understanding of, a wide range of conservation methods and familiarity with various scientific and technical analyses.
